### Report of 1996-1997 Mississippi Junior Division Convention

Inclement weather greeted Mississippi Juniors attending the 81st Annual Junior Division Convention held April 26, 1997 at East Central Community College in Decatur, MS. However, this did not affect the enthusiasm of performers and others attending. We all came to enjoy every minute of the wonderful program planned by our State Junior Counselor. Mrs. James H. (Ann) Fox. The Pledge of Allegiance, National Anthem and Junior Ritual set the stage for the convention. In the absence of our Chaplain, Camille Thelin, our Treasurer, David Reed, led the group in this participation.

The winners of Junior Composers Contest were announced by Debbie Barnes, Chairman, and those present performed their original composition. They were presented a certificate and a monetary award. First place winners are as follows: Class I — Joe Bateman: Class II — David Reed, Class III — Flyn Flesher; Class IV — Luke Gatlin. The Mississippi Piano Camp Scholarship winners were recognized. There was a winner in eleven districts. This camp was held June 21-25, 1997 at Hinds Community College in Raymond.

A special highlight of Junior Day is the report by Sue Luke, Festival Chairman, and Terri Donald, Gold Cup Chairman.

<u>Festival Report:</u> total events - 19; total entrants - 2,387; total superiors - 2,003; total clubs participating - 98.

Gold Cup Report - The totals for the eleven districts are: Total cups presented; 300 - 6", 49 - 8", 14 - 10" and 2 - 12", with 98 teachers and 1,466 juniors participating.

The Festival Honor Society Chairman, Mrs. H. F. Tweedy (Sara), gave the following report: This organization is open to any stu-

dent who has four consecutive superiors or more, with yearly dues of \$1.00. They have 38 members at present, and met prior to the opening of Junior Day activities and elected the following officers for 1997-1998: President - Anjlee Mehta - Dist. IV-A; Vice President - Nina Simmons, Dist. II-A; Secretary-Treasurer - Maggie Long - Dist. VI-A.

The Honors Recital: This is the special feature of the Convention. Each year on Junior Day we honor our consecutive festival winners

beginning with the 5th through 12th. This year the recital featured 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 10th, 11th and 12th year winners. This was an outstanding recital, and showed the wonderful talent of our Mississippi Juniors.

William Waldrop, 1996-1997 President of Mississippi Junior Division, was recognized and asked to read his Music Week Essay, which won first place in Mississippi competition. Following are some excerpts from his closing paragraph of this excellent essay:

"Music is the force that ties the world together. Music encourages people who try but fail, and it gives hope to those who are struggling to reach their dreams. No other force can be compared to the overwhelming and inspiring force of music. Music will always remain a passionate and creative force, a force that the world and mankind will never see diminish." (Ann) Fox, presented two informative and inspiring videos entitled "Music Makes the Difference" distributed by Music Educators National Conference. 

Now, for my final "Thank You's!!!!!" To: Ann Fox for inviting this board member to



#### National Music Week

By Sarah Flanagan, Chairman In celebration of National Music Week at the national level there were over five hundred awards given. Mississippi clubs were the recipients of fifty-three of them.

There were fourteen senior clubs and one junior club who sent in reports. All of these won awards, from honorable mention to a triple won by Jackson MacDowell.

There were a number of newspapers, radio stations, libraries, schools and churches who all participated in various ways.

Four clubs deserve special mention for their efforts.

Canton Music Study Club had very good coverage in their newspapers and especially in their radio station WMGO where ads were sold for the station and the club received 50% of the money for their scholarship program.

Corinth Beethoven Club had their annual "Gift of Love" concert with music presented by a variety of people and styles of music. The money raised goes to their scholarships.

Pontotoc had three recitals, a poster contest and a piano and euphonium recital as well as a band concert of duets, trios and ensembles given at the town library.

Jackson MacDowell had seventeen library displays, twelve churches, and three concerts by the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra. Trustmark National Bank gave a check to be used for National Music Week. The club met during that week and received notice that the Mississippi State Legislature had passed a senate concurrent resolution about National Music Week.

### **Sacred Music Report**

Eighteen of our twenty-two Mississippi music clubs sent in reports, with each one using The Hymns of the Month regularly at meetings. Half of the clubs had Sacred Music Programs and six gave Sacred Programs for the public. Too, Belzoni had a scared music study this year. I was proud to learn that Natchez Musical Arts, Jackson MacDowell, Greenwood Matinee Musicale, Tupelo Fortnightly Musicale, Corinth Music Club and Clarksdale Music Study Club had organized club singing groups - either choruses, ensembles, or smaller groups, but that means that twelve clubs do not formally and regularly utilize the talents of club members in small groups. However, some eight clubs do participate in community choruses and five did participate in communitywide programs.

To the National Chairman it was reported that there were 30 church music directors in Mississippi clubs - 33 total counting the late reports. However, several clubs put all directors, instrumentalists and choir members in one total. So there surely are more directors in our

Reported were some 185 Music Club members who take part in church music programs as organists, choir members, and instrumentalists or directors. To be commended are Belzoni Music Lovers and Sinfonia Music Club or Simpson County who each reported 38 members participating in their church music programs with each having four or these as directors. Belzoni Music Lovers and Tupelo Fortnightly Musicale both had musical home tours.

Church musicians serving 50 years or more that were reported include the following: Pianists Mildred Bush of Belzoni; Gladys Meisburg, Ruth Kelly, Dot Pray, Ruth Doty Lofton of Jackson MacDowell; Organists L'Marie Morgan Erven, Thelma Winborne of Simpson County; and Choir Members Nancy Gunn, Fae Nelson, and Sue Butler of Corinth Beethoven. There are more, I'm sure, as only eight clubs reported.

Last, there is one federated choir - the Methodist Handbell Choir in Canton - and only one composer of Choral Music reported.
